The core project activities have included a trip for Illinois residents to the Equal Justice Initiative sites in Montgomery, Alabama, in September 2024 – the nation's most significant institution for commemorating racial violence – and this follow-up symposium and workshop in Springfield.

 Foster a statewide approach to understanding anti-Black terror, acknowledging the state's geographic breadth.
